She is also a PhD student of the same university in Suceava since 2019, in the field of history, with a research topic entitled “*I. G. Sbiera*” Library of Bukovina, Suceava. Monographic study, coordinated by prof. univ. dr. Olimpia Mitric.

Ovidiu Bătă – engineer geologist, scientific researcher III at the “Bukovina” Institute of Romanian Academy. PhD in Geology (2006) at the “Al. I. Cuza” University of Iași, with the thesis *Palynostratigraphical Study of the Metamorphic Formations from Putna Basin (Bistrița Mountains)*. Serghei Hakman – Deputy Director of the Chernivtsi Regional Centre for Retraining and Professional Development of State Authorities, Local Government, State Enterprises, Institutions and Organization Employees (since 2005), Vice-President of the “Public Resources and Initiatives” Charity Foundation (since 2008), member of Work Commission of “Upper Prut” Euroregion for Interregional and International Cooperation, Local Governing Development and Information (since 2018). He participated to and coordinated many international projects on Ukrainian-Romanian relations, cross-border cooperation and interethnic relations. The author of more than 150 scientific

publications in history of international relations, Ukrainian-Romanian relations, cross-border cooperation and interethnic relations.

Rodica Jugrin – scientific researcher III at the “Bukovina” Institute of the Romanian Academy; PhD in History (2004), with a thesis on the cultural life in Bukovina in the interwar period. Areas of interest: contemporary history, oral history and history of mentalities. She edited several volumes about the history of Bukovina and published books, studies and articles on the evolution of the cultural phenomenon in the province during the interwar period (institutions, personalities), parliamentary life, and anti-communist resistance.

Ewa Kocój – ethnographer and cultural anthropologist who has graduated from Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland, and presently holds a position of an Adjunct Professor at Culture Institute of the Jagiellonian University. Her fields of interest include contemporary religiosity, anthropological interpretation of representations and cultural symbols as well as Eastern Christian spirituality of the Carpathian Mountains region. Eastern Christian iconography and folk art also play a significant role in her studies. Dr Kocój’s research is oriented on the cultural religiosity of Romania in comparison with other Central as well as South-Eastern European countries, Eastern borderlands and national, ethnic and religious stereotypes. She was a recipient of Lanckoronski Foundation, Foundation for Polish Science, Ministry of National Education in Romania and CEEPUS scholarships. Dr Kocój was awarded the Arthur Rojszczak Prize of the Foundation for Polish Science. She was also awarded the prize for the best doctoral thesis in the years 2004–2005, in the field of cultural sciences, by the National Centre for Culture in Poland. The author of the following books: Sanctuaries, persons, icons. Painted Orthodox Churches and Monasteries of South Bukovina in Romanian representations (2006); Romanian Saints (2012), The Memory of Old Centuries. The Symbolism of Time in the Romanian Orthodox Calendar (2013) as well as numerous academic papers published in Poland and elsewhere. She is also the editor of a scientific journal “Zarządzanie w kulturze” (“Culture management”). At this time she is conducting research on the contemporary Eastern Christian rituals in Romania. A co-founder of the Polish-Romanian Society in Krakow.

Harieta Mareci-Sabol – is associated professor at the Faculty of History and Geography of the “Ștefan cel Mare” University of Suceava; PhD in History at the “Alexandru Ioan Cuza” University of Iași (2002), with a thesis on the Romanian historiography. Her monographs, studies and articles pertaining to modern history, history of Bukovina and historiography were published in Romania, Poland, Italy, Turkey and Ukraine. Her research interests include Bukovina’s personalities and its cultural, social, and medical history.

Nataliya Nechaieva-Yuriichuk – PhD, associated professor at the Department of Political Science and Public Administration of the “Yuriy Fedkovych” Chernivtsi National University. Her fields of interests are social communication, information management, international relations, Ukrainian-Romanian relations, cross-border cooperation and interethnic relations. Author of various articles and books such as: „Propaganda’s Role in Reformatting the Political Map of the World: Ukrainian Case”, „Social and Political Development of Ukraine’s Border Areas in Post-Euromaidan Period. Since March 2007 until present he is Secretary General of the County Union of Free Trade Unions – Confederation of Democratic Trade Unions in Romania, Suceava County Branch.

Marian Olaru – scientific researcher at the “Bukovina” Institute of the Romanian Academy. PhD in History (2000). Fields of interest: modern and contemporary history, oral history, microhistory and history of mentalities. He published various studies and articles related to the history of Bukovina, regarding the evolution of the political system in this region during the Austrian occupation, the role of personalities, cultural and political elite from this region in advocating the identity at the end of the 19th century and beginning of the 20th century. He also showed a particular interest in studying the context (phenomena) that resulted in the extinction of the multicultural and multiethnic Bukovina at the end of the Second World War, a process emphasized by the establishment of communist rule in the Central and Eastern Europe.

Liviu Papuc – PhD in Philology (title of thesis: *Leca Morariu. Life and work. Monographic study*); former Head of Service at the Central University Library in Iași; member of the Writers’ Union; author of various articles in newspapers and magazines in Romania and abroad; collective volume editor; translator from universal literature. Elena Pascaniuc – scientific researcher III at the “Bukovina” Institute of the Romanian Academy (Rădăuți); PhD student at the “Ștefan cel Mare” University in Suceava, with a thesis on the folklore in Bukovina. Areas of interest: cultural life in Bukovina, history of folklore in Bukovina. She published studies and articles on these topics in the periodicals: “Analele Bucovinei” (Rădăuți–București); “Meridian Critic”, *Analele Univ. “Ștefan cel Mare” Suceava*, Seria Filologie; “Scriptum” (Suceava).

Alexandrina Popescu-Cruceanu – graduate of the Faculty of History and Geography of the “Ștefan cel Mare” University of Suceava (2003–2008) and the Faculty of Letters, specialization: Romanian and English Language and Literature (University of Bucharest, 2016–2010). Degrees and research stages: master degree in Tourism and Regional Development at the „Ștefan cel Mare” University of Suceava (2010–2012); scientific researcher within the Doctoral School of Chemistry, Life and Earth Sciences of the “Alexandru Ioan Cuza” University from Iași (2012–2015), associate professor at the Faculty of Geography and Geology of the “Alexandru Ioan Cuza” University of Iași (2015–2016); research stages at the Faculté de Lettres, Langues et Sciences Humaines, Université d’Angers, France (2013) and at the Faculty of Geography and Regional Studies, University of Warsaw, Poland. PhD in Geography (2015). Currently, PhD student at the Faculty of History and Geography of the “Ștefan cel Mare” University of Suceava, specializing in History (2020–2023), Master in Management of International Relations and Cross-Border Cooperation (2020–2022), founding member and president of the “Bukovina” Centre of Excellence in Scientific Research Specializing in the field of contemporary history of Bukovina, demographic history of the interwar period, medical geography. Author of research on the economic, psycho-social, cultural aspects of the health of the population in Romania and Poland, literary history and the history of communism in Romania and Poland, medical tourism.

Vasile I. Schipor – Scientific researcher (February 1, 1993 – January 3, 2018), PhD in Humanities (history) (Iasi, November 30, 2014), editor-in-chief of the periodical “The Annals of Bucovina” (1994–2018), honorary scientific secretary of the “Bucovina” Rădăuți (1996–2018). Author of the volumes: *Bucovina istorică. Studii și documente* (Bucharest, 2007); *Calendare și almanahuri românești din Bucovina (1811–1918). Contribuția lor la propășirea cultural-națională a românilor bucovineni* (Iași, 2016) – elaborated on the basis of the doctoral thesis and awarded with the “Dimitrie Onciul” Prize of the Romanian Academy (Bucharest, December 13, 2018); *Bucovina de lângă noi. Viața științifică, literară și artistică la început de mileniu*, vol. I–II (Iași). Contributions to other 10 volumes, some written in collaboration: articles published in over 20 collective volumes, 130 studies and articles printed in scientific publications in the country and abroad; over 120 reviews, literary chronicles and interviews; author of introductory studies, prefaces and postfaces in 14 important works on Bucovina; active participation in over 150 scientific events organized in the country and abroad. Contributions to the organization of international scientific conferences dedicated to Bucovina (1996, 2000, 2003, 2006, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2017).

Constantin Ungureanu – PhD in History (1997); Dr. hab. (2018); scientific researcher at the National Museum of Bucovina in Suceava. He is the author of four monographs on the education and population of Bucovina and of a monograph on the inhabitants of Bucovina and Bessarabia. He collaborated in the elaboration of a historical-statistical study on the population of the Chernivtsi region, a monograph on the Austrian Cadastre in Bucovina, published in German, an ethno-linguistic and confessional atlas of Bucovina, a textbook on the local history of the Chernivtsi region. He published around 165 scientific articles about the history of Bucovina during the period of Austrian rule, which appeared in specialized journals and collections of articles from the Republic of Moldova, Romania, Ukraine and Germany. He received several research and documentation scholarships in Germany (Munich and Augsburg) and Austria (Vienna). Between 2008 and 2010 he collaborated within the international scientific project *Austrian Cadastre in Bucovina and Carinthia in the mid-19th century*, being employed by the University of Innsbruck, Austria.

Alexander Weidle – graduated in History and German Studies at the University of Augsburg in 2017. In 2018, he achieved his “Master of Education” (University of Augsburg/ Uniwersytet im. Adama Mickiewicza w Poznaniu). His PhD-Project (Title: *Institutionalized Remembrance and where it ends: Landsmannschaft and Personal History*) is mainly based on an Oral-History-Project he realized at the Bukowina-Institut Augsburg since 2018. It examines how the “Landsmannschaft der Buchenlanddeutschen” brought about Collective Identity among her members.
