

NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

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Mircea A. Diaconu – Professor and Vice-Rector of “Ștefan cel Mare” University of Suceava, a specialist in Romanian literature, literary critic and historian, chief editor of the journal “Meridian Critic”, and member of the Writers’ Union of Romania. He published several volumes about Romanian poetry and prose. He also edited the works of the Bukovinian writers such as Mircea Streinul, Traian Chelariu, Iulian Vesper and Teofil Lianu. The essays published by Professor Diaconu refer to the condition of literary criticism. He collaborated with other writers on the volume entitled *Romanian Literature as World Literature* (Bloomsbury, USA, 2018).

Elena Florea – History Teacher at Mitocu Dragomirnei Middle School, Suceava County, and PhD candidate at the Doctoral School of “Ștefan cel Mare” University in Suceava, field of history. Studies and published articles include: “The Bukovinian Volunteers in World War I”; “The Voice of Bukovina and Its Role in Promoting the Union of Bukovina with the Kingdom of Romania”; “Promoting the Ideal of the Union of Bessarabia, Bukovina, and Transylvania”. She also wrote articles that are part of the series “Romanian Newspapers on the Union of Bessarabia, Bukovina, and Transylvania”, vol. Vlad D. Gafița – PhD lecturer at the Faculty of History and Geography at “Ștefan cel Mare” University in Suceava. He is specialized in modern and contemporary history, teaching disciplines such as Modern and Contemporary Political History, Universal Contemporary History, History of Right Totalitarianism in the Interwar Period etc. He obtained his doctorate with a theme related to the history of Romanian nationalism in Bukovina (*Iancu Flondor (1865–1924) and the National Movement of the Romanians in Bukovina*). Vlad Gafița is currently dealing with the theoretical origins of the extreme right-wing in the interwar period.

Silvia Ginghină – primary care physician at Clinical Hospital “Sf. Ioan cel Nou” in Suceava. She earned her medical degree from the Faculty of Medicine in Bucharest (1988) and completed her specialization in medical oncology at the Oncological Institute, Cluj Napoca (1990–1993), focusing later on clinical studies as a sub-investigator (2005). She is pursuing a PhD in Philosophy, with a thesis entitled *Clinical Research on Human Subjects. Ethical perspectives*. Her areas of interest cover, in addition to medical clinical research, medical ethics, and the history of medicine.

Luzian Geier – former researcher of the “Bukowina” Institute Augsburg/Germany, specialized on the history of multilingual press from Banat between 1771 and 1981; editor and chief-editor of the „Kaindl-Archiv” magazine of the Bukowina-Institute in Augsburg and, since 1994, the chief-editor of the monthly publication of the Association of Bukovinean Germans. Luzian Geier is the author of many studies in history and history of culture, also the author of many articles published in scientific books and magazines.

Rodica Jugrin – scientific researcher III at the “Bukovina” Institute of the Romanian Academy; PhD in History (2004), with a thesis on the cultural life in Bukovina in the interwar period. Areas of interest: contemporary history, oral history and history of mentalities. She edited several volumes about the history of Bukovina and published books, studies and articles on the evolution of the cultural phenomenon in the province during the interwar period (institutions, personalities), parliamentary life, and anti-communist resistance.

Helena Krasowska – Polish linguist and professor at the Institute of Slavic Studies of the Polish Academy of Sciences in Warsaw and visiting professor at the Center for Eastern Europe at the University of Warsaw. Since 2004, employed at the Institute of Slavic Studies of the Polish Academy of Sciences (IS PAN), where she defended her doctoral thesis entitled “The language of Polish highlanders in Bukowina” („Język polskich górali na Bukowinie”) and the habilitation dissertation entitled “Polish minority in south-eastern Ukraine” („Mniejszość polska na południowo-wschodniej Ukrainie”). She is currently working as a professor IS PAN. She specializes in issues related to dialectology, sociolinguistics, ethnology, and folklore. Scientific interests focus on the issues of national and linguistic minorities, linguistic biographies, cultural borderlands, linguistic contacts, multilingualism, multi-social and individual memory. She is particularly interested in Bukovina. She conducts field research in Ukraine, Moldova, Romania and Georgia. Her achievements include 7 original monographs and 8 co-authored monographs. She translates poetry from Polish to Ukrainian, writes essays and poems.

Harieta Mareci-Sabol – is associated professor at the Faculty of History and Geography of the “Ștefan cel Mare” University of Suceava; PhD in History at the “Alexandru Ioan Cuza” University of Iași (2002), with a thesis on the Romanian historiography. Her monographs, studies and articles pertaining to modern history, history of Bukovina and historiography were published in Romania, Poland, Italy, Turkey and Ukraine. Her research interests include Bukovina’s personalities and its cultural, social, and medical history.

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Marian Olaru – scientific researcher at the “Bukovina” Institute of the Romanian Academy. PhD in History (2000). Fields of interest: modern and contemporary history, oral history, microhistory and history of mentalities. He published various studies and articles related to the history of Bukovina, regarding the evolution of the political system in this region during the Austrian occupation, the role of personalities, cultural and political elite from this region in advocating the identity at the end of the XIXth century and beginning of the XXth century. He also showed a particular interest in studying the context (phenomena) that resulted in the extinction of the multicultural and multiethnic Bukovina at the end of the Second World War, a process emphasized by the establishment of communist rule in the Central and Eastern Europe.

Ihor Piddubny – graduate of the Faculty of History at Chernivtsi State University (1986), is currently a senior lecturer with a doctoral degree and habilitation at the Department of Universal History at Yuriy Fedkovych Chernivtsi National University. Phd in 2020. Areas of interest: the political history of Romania during the interwar period, the history of Bukovina in the interwar period, museography. 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Gina Puică – PhD from the University of Nice-Sophia Antipolis (France), is a lecturer at “Ștefan cel Mare” University in Suceava. For several years, she taught Romanian language at Yuriy Fedkovych National University in Chernivtsi (Ukraine) and at the University of Strasbourg (France). Among her publications is the volume *Theodor Cazaban or The Silent Revolt: A Romanian Writer in Exile* (Paris, Hermann, 2018). She co-edited with Liubov Melnychuk the volume *Linguistic and Cultural Interferences in Chernivtsi and Beyond* (Suceava University Press, 2021), authored numerous articles on Romanian and French literary spaces, and contributed to the *Dictionary of Cioranian Terms*, vol. I, coordinated by Simona Constantinovici (West University of Timișoara Press and Criterion Editrice, Milan, 2020). Gina Puică is also a literary translator and a founding member of the translation journal “Atelier de Traduction”.

Constantin Ungureanu – PhD in History (1997); Dr. hab. (2018); scientific researcher at the National Museum of Bukovina in Suceava. He is the author of four monographs on the education and population of Bukovina and of a monograph on the inhabitants of Bukovina and Bessarabia. He collaborated in the elaboration of a historical-statistical study on the population of the Chernivtsi region, a monograph on the Austrian Cadastre in Bukovina, published in German, an ethno-linguistic and confessional atlas of Bukovina, a textbook on the local history of the Chernivtsi region. He published around 165 scientific articles about the history of Bukovina during the period of Austrian rule, which appeared in specialized journals and collections of articles from the Republic of Moldova, Romania, Ukraine and Germany. He received several research and documentation scholarships in Germany (Munich and Augsburg) and Austria (Vienna). Between 2008 and 2010 he collaborated within the international scientific project *Austrian Cadastre in Bukovina and Carinthia in the mid-19th century*, being employed by the University of Innsbruck, Austria.
